In the realm of City business, it is again budget season. At the Monday, November 7 City Council meeting, I formally presented my budget to

the Council for their consideration. Same as for 2015/2016, this budget was developed collaboratively by City leadership, the Council, and key staff. Rooted in the foundation of the goals set forth in the City's adopted Strategic Plan, this biennium's priorities are to:

- Cultivate safe, attractive and welcoming neighborhoods
- Promote dynamic urban environments
- Leverage effective partnerships and collaboration
- Encourage healthy, safe and affordable housing
- Maximize Tukwila's significant economic strength and potential
- Ensure organizational effectiveness and responsible financial stewardship; and
- Foster civic pride and an informed community

The 2017/2018 budget is fiscally sound, and the forecast for the coming years - barring an economic event - shows that our City remains in good fiscal health.

This budget has been more collaborative than previous budget processes in which I have taken part. It is the product of much hard work from the Council, City staff, residents who participated in our budget outreach efforts, and the broader community. This year we held two in-person open houses on the budget, as well as an online open house. Community members were able to review and discuss our identified priorities, and tell us which items in the proposed work plan were most important to them. Beyond the open houses, we also mailed information on the budget to each residence, published multiple articles on the City Pages in the Tukwila Reporter, utilized TukTV on Comcast Channel 21, and reached out through the City's social media platforms.

The City Council played an integral role in the budget process this year. Over the summer and into fall, each Council committee performed significant preliminary review of all facets of the budget. This collaborative work, in my opinion, resulted in a better budget. The upfront work and review provided by the Council allowed us to incorporate their thoughtful feedback, including additional investments in direct human services funding.

Budgets are guiding documents that lay out the priorities, work plan and road map for the next two years. I am pleased with the collaborative effort in developing this work product for presenting to the Council, and look forward to their review process as we finish the City's 2017/2018 biennial budget.

Large neighborhood planning effort coming watch for TIB Neighborhood Rising in 2017

Looking toward the future in Tukwila, the City is exploring how to improve the experiences of current and future residents, businesses and visitors in the Tukwila International Boulevard (TIB) neighborhood. Revising development rules and focusing public and private investments will help fulfill the vision, goals and policies for the TIB neighborhood adopted in 2015, as set forth in the City's Comprehensive Plan.

To move in this direction, the City of Tukwila is working with CNU (www.CNU.org,) a national organization of professionals whose mission is "building places people love." A weekend workshop - "TIB Neighborhood Rising" - is being organized for early in 2017 (February 23-26). Lead by CNU, this kick-off event invites the public to participate in open houses and focus groups, and to review ideas that will influence the future of the neighborhood.

The CNU team of experts will be seeking input from property owners, residents, businesses, and others concerned about the character and future of the neighborhood. They will ask what should be done to create a vibrant and walkable neighborhood. Participants will discuss sidewalks, streetscapes, smaller blocks/streets, and city facilities - where they should go and how they should be configured to provide the most benefit for the community.

We're on the edge of winter - here's some power outage safety tips

- Only use flashlights or glowsticks for emergency lighting; candles can cause fires.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed. Most food requiring refrigeration can be kept safely in a closed refrigerator for several hours. An unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours. A full freezer will keep its temperature for about 48 hours.
- Conserve water.
- Put on layers of warm clothing if it is cold outside.

NEVER use gas ovens, gas ranges, barbecues or portable or propane heaters for indoor heating – they use oxygen and create carbon monoxide that can cause suffocation. If the power may be out for a prolonged period, plan to go to another location (the home of a relative or friend, or a public facility) that has heat to keep warm

• Only use generators away from your home – NEVER run a generator inside a home or garage, or connect it to your home's electrical system. Turn off lights and electrical

appliances except for the refrigerator and freezer. Even if it's dark, turn light switches and buttons on lamps or appliances to the "off" position.

- Turn off or unplug computers and other sensitive equipment to avoid damage in case of a momentary power "surge" when power is restored. (Consider adding surge protectors.)
- Leave one lamp on, so you'll know when the power is restored. Wait at least 15 minutes after power has been restored before turning on other appliances.
