An intimate look into the lives of students at an alternative high school in Walla Walla that specializes in educating traumatized youth, and how positive discipline has turned a culture of violence, drugs, and underachievement into a college-bound sanctuary for teens.

Three homeless teenagers in Chicago fight to stay in school, graduate, and build a brighter future. These teens struggle with poverty, race, juvenile justice, immigration, foster care, and LGBTQ rights ... all while trying to access the education to which they are entitled.

Wednesday, May 11: "Refugees of Shangri-La"



From Bhutan to camps to exile to resettlement—meet the refugees involved in a human-rights crisis that has gone largely unrecognized. Bhutan's international reputation is of "Gross National Happiness," but its 75,000 exiles tell a much different story of cultural persecution.
